Dear Friends of Second Church,

This afternoon I watched a zoom lecture on church music in Congregational churches during the Colonial and Early Federal period.

I was surprised to learn that instruments didn't much figure in worship at all until about 1720 — with the first organs appearing only after about 1770, and most being installed (at tremendous expense) after about 1810.

A more typical instrument in the 18th century was the double viol, not unlike a cello, which was able to anchor the congregational singing and led with a more accurate pitch than any of the readily available alternatives.

The scandal was in the singing. There were a lot of people writing and preaching about it, so when I say “scandal,” I mean it.

Apparently, most churches did not have hymnals, or, in any case, congregations that were trained musically to be able to read them — so when it was time to sing a hymn, people more or less stood up and went for it with gusto, with each singing at their own tempo, at high volume, doing their best with the tune (such as it was).

(You can see why they thought the double viol was a good investment — or later, the organ, the sound of which could fill the sanctuary.)

Ultimately, a number of solutions emerged in addition to just plain louder instruments — better training, more soloists, etc.

The scandal dissipated as the music improved, and the world of church music as so many of us grew up with it, first began to come into view.

But there was one big downside: the world of individual believers singing joyfully (if not in unison or melodically) as a form of **worship** gave way to a more passive experience: the congregation began to understand itself as an **audience**. The participation that had been a unique feature of singing (and a break from and response to their extended listening to the pastor) was no longer quite the same.

For a while, some of the emotional release of music went away, at least until better musical training in the form of evening “singing schools” for young people, higher literacy for reading the lyrics, and the backbone of the organ covering up when the pastor started in the wrong key, all helped to restore

some of what had been lost.

To me, this is more than an interesting footnote to our history.

As churches, our goal is to invite participation in all the different aspects of our life together, not just gather an audience for what we do.

We need to remember that participation can be a little ragged, even a little discordant at times...but that this shows a different kind of beauty. Sometimes I worry that coming to church is like watching baseball on t.v., where most of it looks like a game being played by three people: the pitcher, the batter, and the catcher (Alexander, Jenny, and Max?) — when, of course, what's happening is so much bigger, more inclusive, more intricate and wonderful. And the point is for everyone to hop up and join in. When is the last time you really **worshipped** in Worship? What would it allow us to become if we did?

Wouldn't it be wonderful to find out?


