## From the Senior Minister's Desk

### What To Do With A Date?

I was going to have Chris Tate preach his first sermon with us on the second Sunday in September. Then I saw the date - 9/11! His giving primary leadership to worship should be a day filled with unhindered joy, so he will preach on 9/18.

As the years pass, 9/11 still wrenches our souls. The body counts in Iraq - of innocent soldiers and civilians; attacks by mostly mindless terrorists in England, Spain, and Egypt keep the memory of that bright sunny skied day four years ago when the darkness of evil struck close to home.

As people of faith, how can we deal with the pain that ominous date elicits? I begin my thinking with a quote I once heard - "Pain is inevitable. Suffering is optional." Good Friday announces that even with God's love protecting us, pain goes with life. However, we also remember an Easter morning of ultimate healing. The opposite of suffering is healing. In the face of pain, let us not allow the frustration and anger and distress that define "suffering" overtake our call by Christ to be healers in the midst of pain. Let me offer some thoughts on how to deal with the date of 9/11.

- On 9/11, and everyday, pray for all people who are affected by terrorism - people who lost loved ones on 9/11; soldiers and their families; innocent people who are hurt or killed because of the acts of terrorists.
- Let us add to those prayers a time of reflection on the question: "How would Christ address the issues of terrorism and the underlying causes of such evil behavior?"
- Let us then commit ourselves to being as a friend of mine says "Guerrillas of Grace." Let us seek to involve ourselves in ministries of healing and reconciliation.
- And unless we are to become cynical about life, let us not only lift up to God our prayers of intercession, but, let us lift up to God prayers of praise. There is another adage that says: "We have no right to ask when sorrow comes, 'Why did this happen to (me / us)?' unless we ask the same question for every moment of happiness that comes our way."

As people of faith there is no date on which we are ever separated from God's love revealed to us in Christ Jesus.

# Let Me Introduce Myself...

*A little more about who I am, and how I got here*



What a thrill and a joy it is to have been called to Second Church as your Associate Minister! A number of you have already had an opportunity to meet me, Chris Tate, either during the search and call process or during a "drop-in" at the church. Most of you have probably seen the introductory brochure that Gerry Mayfield and the personnel committee thoughtfully put together as an initial introduction. Many of you, however, may be wondering "Who is this guy?" "What brought him to Second Church?"

I'd like to take my newsletter space this month to offer at least the beginnings of an answer to those questions. By giving you a glimpse into my journey of faith, I hope I can provide some insight into the path that brought me to this unique, caring community.

Eight years ago, if you had asked me whether I thought I'd be an Associate Minister someday I would have told you, probably through tears, "Impossible." God and I weren't on especially congenial terms back then.

I have never felt more alone, never more abandoned, than when my father died. In 1997, the helicopter in which he was riding malfunctioned and fell, upside-down, into New York City's East River. Amidst the pain, amidst the grief, amidst an oppressive sense of chaos enveloping me I listened, desperately, for God's voice...and for a long time I didn't hear it.

Or, perhaps better put, I **couldn't** hear it— at least not then. Looking back though, I think God began calling to me from the moment I hung up the phone, stunned by my mother's stammered words: "Christopher...your father is dead." God was right there in the unexpected, yet unhesitating, embrace of my usually aloof, math-major roommate, saying "I love you." In the weeks and months that followed, God called to me every time I left a church service and went into a back hallway to cry, saying: "You're in my house, you're safe, let it all out, I miss him too." In the years that followed, God called to me through my work with youth at the First Presbyterian Church of New Canaan, saying: "See the joy this brings to you and your community, come, serve!"

God called continuously, steadfastly, and finally, one otherwise ordinary day a few years ago, as I sat in my office staring at my computer screen, "my ears were opened" and I heard. Even then, God's voice was more a faint whisper than a powerful shout, but it was loud enough...and persistent! It was a voice of opportunity, of wonder, of love, and of joy. Hearing it, I thought to myself: "How can I have gone from the broken person I was to the person I am, considering education in and a career in ministry? It **is** a miracle!" Then, "But can I be ready? Can I really do this? Dare I answer?" In intent, ethereal wisps of possibility, I heard "Yes!"

At once a reassurance and a challenge I followed God's call, leaving the safety of what I knew, resisting opportunities to change course, and above all trusting I would be lead to where I ought to be, which we have mutually discovered is here, at Second Church. It has been thrilling, fulfilling, and— at times— terrifying to be on this journey, but with each warm smile and each welcoming greeting I am increasingly sure that this resting place, Second Church, is right. I look forward to joyfully sharing in the vibrant life of this community, celebrating with you, ministering with your young people (and your somewhat-less-young people too!), worshipping with you, and joining with you as you strive to be an imaginative, committed community of faith.

If you had asked me eight years ago whether I thought I'd be an Associate Minister someday, I would have told you "Impossible." I am immeasurably grateful that "For God, all things are possible," and I can find myself here, with all of you! Many Blessings,

## News From the Youth Choir

"...and a great time was had by all!" An enthusiastic ending to the story of the choir's Tour 2005. On Saturday, July 9<sup>th</sup> we boarded British Airways flight 174 that took us away for two weeks of singing and fun. On Sunday, July 24<sup>th</sup> flight 815 brought us home with memories that will last a lifetime.

Memories of Ely and its cathedral - "our cathedral." The Youth Choir has a special place in its cultural memory for Ely. The choir first traveled to Europe in 1996. We were a small and very young choir. The program was only 4 years old, and most of the 18 singers had just reached high school age. Through a personal contact - one of those "I know someone who knows someone who knows someone" - we were booked to sing one Evensong service at Ely Cathedral. It was an awe-inspiring experience, and we all wanted to do it again. Following the service we asked if we could have permission to sing "just one chord" in the cathedral's Lady Chapel. Very kindly the sexton unlocked the chapel, which was closed for the day, and we sang our chord. We held the chord for just a brief moment, but it continued to "sing" for six seconds! That was the acclaimed Lady Chapel acoustic, and we wanted to sing a whole concert in that space. Since 1996, we have returned to Ely during each of our performance tours as a visiting choir to sing services in the cathedral and as a featured concert in the Lady Chapel. We are "at home" living in the Junior Choir House which is in the close of medieval buildings in the cathedral precinct. We gobble down the Bird's custard which the dining hall staff cooks up especially for us. We feed the cathedral's farm animals. And we hold our nightly "Ultimate Frisbee" games in the park within the shadow of the cathedral towers. Ely is truly "our cathedral."

When people ask me about my tour memories they always get the "Ely story." Ely is the thread which ties our first tour choir to each of the succeeding tour choirs. Every touring chorister knows Ely. Every touring chorister loves Ely. Every touring chorister has memories of Ely.

Of course there are many other Tour 2005 memories to share:

- concerts for parishes in Godmanchester and Thetford. (In Thetford the Mayor, resplendent in his silver medieval medallion of office, made a speech thanking us for our performance);
- singing for the residents of the Sue Ryder Care Center;
- a day trip to Peterborough and sight-seeing in Cambridge;

- the Raptor Foundation in St. Ives where we were taught how to "catch" a hawk or owl on our wrist - wearing a long, thick leather glove, of course - (and, yes, I did that!);
- a concert at Scotland's Stirling Castle; in Edinburgh singing Evensong services in St. Mary's Cathedral and a concert in the amazing sound of St. Giles' Cathedral;
- the Farewell Banquet served by the dining hall staff of the Merchiston Castle School where we stayed while in Edinburgh - delicious food, a traditional "ode" to haggis which was read after the dish was carried into the hall accompanied by bagpipes and bard dressed in his kilt (haggis? no one volunteered to taste it!), and Scottish dancing by all to end the evening and our time in Scotland;
- our final weekend in Denmark - Copenhagen's Tivoli Garden, a concert at Herstedvesterkirke in Albertslund (a church packed with lovely people), a day trip to North Sealand with the lovely village of Helsingør and Elsinore Castle (the setting of Shakespeare's "Hamlet"), a dip in the North Sea (only my toes), and the NEVER TO BE FORGOTTEN Festive Final Dinner at the Hard Rock Café Copenhagen!

Those are my memories. Watch for chorister memories in the October Steeple News. "...and a great time was had by all!"

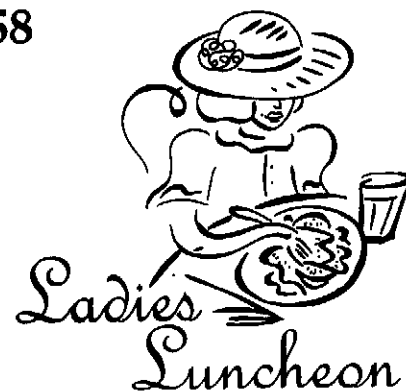

## Children's Ministries

Welcome back! September is an exciting time of change and transition, especially for children. As leaves change their pigment, children shift from summer vacation back into the school routine, meeting new teachers, starting a different grade, and sometimes changing schools. We're experiencing transition as well, and though we can be secure in the consistency of our church community and in God's embracing love, it is exciting (and sometimes a little bit scary) to embark on new beginnings.

During the summer, we have had a multi-age church school program. After the Children's Message each Sunday morning at the 9:30 a.m. worship service, children of all ages have headed upstairs to help Henry Bast, our wonderfully creative artist-in-residence, with a colorful cartoon mural encompassing many of our favorite Bible stories. It has been a fantastic and free-flowing experience with spectacular results. Please feel free to come upstairs after church to see what the children accomplished this summer!

In September, we will be transitioning back to a more structured Church School program with children divided by age group. As usual, infants will be in the nursery with Jesse Adams. We will also be hiring a Toddler Specialist to implement the Hands-on Bible curriculum for the children in the toddler playroom, enabling the parents of young children to attend worship and volunteer elsewhere in the church school. We are very happy to have Carol Dixon returning to continue to teach the Pre-K class for three and four year old children with the Bible Quest curriculum.

Our elementary (K-5) church school will be experiencing a transition as well. Over the past three years, I have greatly enjoyed introducing Second Congregational Church to the Workshop Rotation Format by creating workshops to meet our needs. This year, I will be selecting workshops from the Cornerstones curriculum to fit our congregation's personality and schedule.

Workshop Rotation is a Christian Education method in which several (in our case, three) classes rotate through workshops on a Bible story or topic over several Sundays. Workshops are hands-on, interactive and multisensory, through activities such as art, cooking, drama, music, games, computers, mission, or maps. Thus, children who learn in a variety of ways can all experience success in themselves and their peers. Additionally, stories are covered in-depth and teachers get to teach the same lesson multiple times to different age-groups, allowing for less prep time and a more enjoyable teaching experience.

This year's theme will be "Welcome to the Family," discussing what it means to be a part of a family, a Church family and the Christian family -- and to welcome all

people to the Christian community. Our first story will be Jacob and Esau, a story of sibling rivalry, family dynamics and (eventually) peaceful reconciliation. We will be exploring the many facets of this story through workshops in storytelling, art, cooking and games.

Sixth and seventh grade students will continue in the Pre-Confirmation program we began in 2004. Last year we focused on Church History. This year we will be returning to our study of the Bible, its structure and how it came to be. As a part of this project, each member of the sixth and seventh grade class will receive a personal study Bible to be kept in the Youth Room for the entire school year as we gain hands-on experience marking it up and finding our way around in it. It is a great way to learn and creates a wonderful tool to use in 8<sup>th</sup> grade Confirmation class and throughout their lives.

We will be wrapping up our mural project on Sunday, September 4<sup>th</sup>. Church School Registration and Homecoming takes place on Sunday the 11<sup>th</sup>, and we will be starting our first Workshop Rotation topic of the school year on Sunday, September 18<sup>th</sup>.

As many of you know, I am making a big transition myself. I have moved to Manhattan to begin fulltime studies at Union Theological Seminary, working toward Ordination and a Master of Divinity Degree. This is a huge and exciting change, and I would like to thank the congregation of Second Congregational Church for all of your support as I pursue this path. During my studies, I will continue working with the children of the church on a part time basis. You will still see me on Sunday mornings and at family events. I will also continue to lead the JOY pre-youth group for 4<sup>th</sup> and 5<sup>th</sup> grade students. Unfortunately, I will no longer have the time to lead the middle and high school youth groups, but am very pleased that Chris Tate will be taking on this responsibility. He is a talented minister to youth and I look forward to seeing the progress that the groups will experience under his leadership.

Again, thank you all and I look forward to seeing you on Homecoming Sunday!

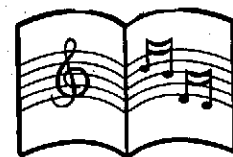
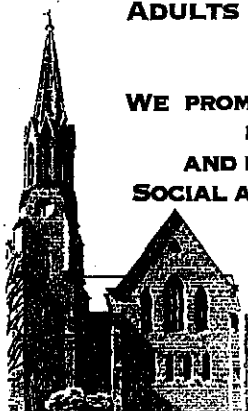

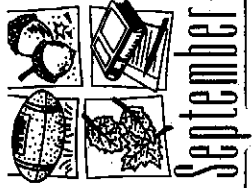
