Dear Friends of Second Church,

As it happens, I went into the City yesterday to see a good friend who was passing through. Walking crosstown from Grand Central felt like standing in a wind tunnel, and I found myself wondering what it might be like on Bora-Bora just then—or if maybe Gilligan's Island could use a pastor in the mix after all these years.

There are those who say there is no such thing as bad weather, only inadequate clothing — and I appreciate the spirit of that, although it isn't my view.

But with that said, when it comes to living our lives in light of "current conditions," we know full well that the atmospheric ones are often far from the most challenging.

By the same token, in those other conditions (emotional, professional, relational... you get it), it's not like holing up and just waiting for better weather is a real option.

We need to learn what we need to move forward even when we're out in the storm. Especially then.

It's important to be warm and dry, of course. What keeps us patient and focused? What prompts us to speak or listen, or teaches us when to trust or stay skeptical?

Our faith has a lot to say on such topics, and a lot it would encourage us to know about ourselves and the world as we head out into the elements...or discover ourselves out among them by no choice of our own.

Jesus walking across the water, stilling the storm; Elijah seeking shelter from the whirlwind and the fire, only to be greeted by the sound of sheer silence—Scripture is well aware of the divine presence in places that seem downright godless, much less hopeless by any human way of reckoning.

It says in the most uncertain terms that godlessness is not a thing, and offers that certainty as a place to begin, even when the storms seem to be doing their worst.

God loves us in all seasons and all weathers—and any condition, even the most dire, will finally reveal God's presence for those with eyes to see.



As we enter the season of snow days and bitter winds, may we learn to look for him and know the warmth of that love.
