Dear Friends of Second Church,

In the first few days after Easter, I always feel like one of those people Jesus heals by a miracle and then sends back home.

Everything has changed, but there I am...back again...reintroduced into the familiar world which for the most part, hasn't asked, hasn't hoped, and hasn't worked for changes of its own since the last time I checked in.

Any circumstances of my departure or return, and any miracles associated with either, don't seem have attracted much notice...not that it was supposed to be about their noticing.

C.S. Lewis captures this nicely at the end of *The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe*, when the four Pevensie children, who have fought battles, won wars, and gone on to serve for years as kings and queens, somehow find themselves back through the wardrobe that connects Narnia to our world, *and*...that lifetime away with all its attainments has disappeared, they are kids again, and have only been gone a moment.

How do we hold onto the people that Easter tells us we've become?

One part of the answer is this: if Easter has done a reasonable part of its work, it has broadened our perspective.

It teaches us to see what is important (and what isn't) with new clarity.

It dissolves so much of what is supposed to impress us—or control us—by helping us to recognize God's role in the story, and by extension, *in our own stories*. That puts different people and circumstances at the center, changes our role, recalibrates how we understand both setbacks and growth.

If we seek to hold on to that wisdom and don't just fall back into the world's familiar account of itself (and of us), we have a firmer grasp on how to live differently. Our closest attention is directed elsewhere as we come to notice different things and respond accordingly.

To all outward appearances, nothing has changed—the car still needs gas, those forms need to be signed and submitted, we get back from CVS and suddenly remember the thing we actually needed at CVS, and people near and far prove

themselves more aggravating than ever in their people-ing.

But within, with our hearts and minds transformed, we are coming to see it all differently. To know the presence of Jesus within it, and so, to start telling its story in a new way, as heralds of the dawn.
